When Ted Cruz spent time with his daughters on a trip to Cancun, he possessed just as much responsibility for them as he does in his role as an elected official.

This duty is particularly demanding when an event or circumstance that no one can solve individually occurs unexpectedly and changes the lives of everyone collectively. We each get cold without enough warmth. We get hungry without enough food, and we get scared when the future of our basic services is no longer certain. It isn't enough for one groups' views to be represented, because one groups' views aren't the whole of a public servant's constituency.

I can think of no greater privilege or responsibility than to be trusted to take care of the life of someone who disagrees with us, because in no other society than one founded on democratic principles is this opportunity afforded.

Society was formed to make solving for these challenges easier. Democracy was conceived to create the highest long-term returns to each member. Our republic imbues our elected representatives with a dual mandate - be one of us, and see our future through your eyes.
